Meeting Minutes

1. Meeting Formalities

1.1. Attendance and Apologies

The Chair welcomed Kelly Hunt as an observer to the Meeting. The Chair advised the Committee, pending the Minister's decisions of him being appointed as the second TARFish nominated Representative.

1.2. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted.

1.3 Register of Interest

No change to the Register of Interest.

1.4 Minister's Correspondence/ Decisions from Previous Meetings

To date the Department of Natural Resources and Environment Tasmania (NRE Tas) has not received the signed Resolution Sheet.

The RecFAC were requested to provide comment out of session on the Abalone Size Limits. That recommendation was sent to the Minister along with Meeting 80 recommendations.

- *Recommendation 1- Abalone Size Limits (Out of Session)*

That the Minister implements the proposed size limits for the commercial fishery within the timeframe proposed which reflects the "three year rule".

RecFAC also requested that the Minister note that RecFAC has previously supported an increase of the abalone size limit to 145 mm on the east coast and reaffirmed that the increased size limit be introduced as soon as possible.

The Department is proceeding with the size limit changes.

- *Recommendation 2 - Garfish Spawning Closure*

The recreational fishery be closed for the same period as the commercial fishery.

The Department has implemented the closure. Public Notices have been published and the changes have been updated on the website.

- *Recommendation 3 - Opening Elephant Rock and North Bay Research Area*

- 1. That the Elephant Rock and North Bay Research Areas be opened initially under a restricted fishing framework to allow research that could assist in future management responses to recreational rock lobster fishers preferences.*
- 2. That the Elephant Rock and North Bay Research Areas be set aside for an interim period as recreational-only areas to allow the efficacy of such areas to be assessed.*

This item is listed on this Meeting's Agenda to be discussed further.

TARFish requested an update on the recommendation to review the East Coast Rebuilding Strategy for Rock Lobster, discussed in RecFAC Meeting 77, and whether the recommendation was accepted by the Minister. The Department member responded this was not a formal recommendation to the Minister and the action item was provide RecFAC members the

previous letter from the Chair to the Minister regarding RecFACs concerns over the catch share. The Department member also reiterated that the information paper for the recent rock lobster rules stated that the targets were not met as the recreational catch was not reduced on several occasions and then more recently although the commercial catch cap was reduced it may not have been reduced to the required level.

The RecFAC members stated the importance to review previous decisions and understand the impacts of the decisions not to undertake catch adjustments to ensure targets and timelines are met, and how other factors contributed into the stock rebuilding of the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone.

The FAC members agree there should be a review of the previous East Coast Rebuilding Strategy prior to the development of the Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy to consider what happened and determine why targets were not met. This then could be documented in the new Harvest Strategy. Factors that could impact on decision making should be identified, eg protecting jobs, localised impacts etc. and what the impacts could be if a decision is made not to follow triggers set in the Harvest Strategy.

Action Item 1: *NRE Tas and TARFish to collaborate to document factors which impacted stock rebuilding, and lessons learnt and how these can be incorporated into the new Harvest Strategy. The draft document to be tabled at the next meeting.*

1.5 Action Items from previous meeting(s)

Action Item 1: Provide RecFAC with the timelines for the development of the Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy is on the Agenda for discussion.

2. Rock Lobster Fishery

The Department representative updated the RecFAC members on the discussion and outcomes of the RecFAC Rock Lobster Working Group, which met on 10 November 2022. The purpose of the Working Group meeting was to consider the fisheries assessment for rock lobster and then to provide that preliminary advice to the remainder of the RecFAC to formalise the advice and recommendations on the Total Allowable Catch (TAC), the Catch Cap Areas and provide advice on Rock Lobster Area 5.

2.1 Rock Lobster TAC

The Working Group recommended that there be no change to the TAC. They noted the reference points were met.

2.2 East Coast/ Northeast Catch Caps

The Working Group supported the catch cap for the North-East region being maintained at 100 tonnes. However, when discussing the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone, there was some concern about the reliance and the assumption rock lobster translocation would occur. If translocation was not to occur, then the commercial catch cap would need to be adjusted. The Working Group also suggested that we need confidence of at least meeting the 20% biomass rebuilding goal by the 2025 target date.

IMAS presented additional modelling at the RecFAC meeting showing that if translocation were not to occur, the virgin biomass will only reach 19% by 2025. The proposed commercial catch cap of 94 tonnes relies on translocation occurring. If that does not occur the commercial catch

cap will need to be reduced in the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone by 40 – 45 tonnes, which will equate to a reduction on the East Coast commercial catch cap to 60 tonnes.

IMAS also reported that if such a reduction were made to the East Coast Catch Cap it would not need a corresponding reduction to the state-wide TAC.

RecFAC stated if there is to be a reduction due to lack of translocation, then it should be applied to the commercial sector, as the recent female size increase impacts more on the recreational sector. In addition, it was noted that the Government election commitment to work towards increasing take arrangements for the recreational fishery, implies adjustments be made to the commercial sector.

The Committee acknowledged the reduction may have a significant impact commercial fishers and request the Department to investigate other management controls to mitigate the impact of a commercial catch reduction.

2.3 Potential Steps for Area 5 (Northwest)

Klaas Hartmann, IMAS, reported that egg production exceeds the 20% reference point, however the biomass remains below the 20 % reference point. Modelling indicates the current commercial catch of 270 tonnes, would need to be substantially decreased to achieve the 20% target. IMAS indicated that they do not have high concerns about under achieving of the biomass target in this assessments area due to other indicators - high growth rates and high catch rate. It appears that the modelling may be overly conservative, and the assumptions associated with virgin biomass need to be recalculated. This would however take several years to do, as it may require the setting up of a small no-take temporary research area in the northwest.

RecFAC note the uncertainty of the low virgin biomass in Area 5 and recognised the uncertainty of the actual virgin biomass, plus acknowledge this area has very high growth and catch rates. RecFAC recommend consideration of these factors should be considered when developing the Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy with the aim of rebuilding the biomass to the target reference point as defined in the Strategy.

Recommendation 1- Rock Lobster TAC 2023/24

The rock lobster TAC for the 2023/24 quota year be set at the same level as 2022/23.

Recommendation 2 – Rock Lobster East Coast Catch Cap

The RecFAC recommend the East Coast Catch Cap (ECCC) remain unchanged at 94 tonnes subject to an assurance that rock lobster translocation will continue at a level no less than previous seasons.

In the event that such an assurance is not forthcoming then the ECCC should be reduced by the amount modelled by IMAS needed to achieve the 20% rebuilding target in all assessment areas within the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone by 2025.

Because the recently introduced increase in female size limits disproportionately impacts the recreational sector as compared with the commercial sector, as a matter of fairness any reduction in the ECCC should be applied to the commercial sector.

RecFAC recognises that such a reduction could have a significant impact on commercial east coast rock lobster fishers and encourages NRE Tas to explore management approaches designed to mitigate this impact.

Recommendation 3 – Rock Lobster North-East Catch Cap 2023/24

The rock lobster North-East Catch Cap for the 2023/24 quota year be set at the same level as 2022/23.

Recommendation 4 – Rock Lobster Area 5

The Minister notes RecFAC's concern with the continued low biomass in area 5 (16% of virgin biomass).

Ordinarily such a low biomass would trigger management action to rebuild the stock, however, given the high growth rates and high catch rates in area 5, coupled with uncertainty about the true virgin biomass level, the Committee does not recommend any such action at this time.

RecFAC does recommend though that these matters be taken into account in the development of a Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy with a view to rebuilding the stocks in area 5 to the appropriate target level outlined in the Strategy.

2.4 Harvest Strategy Update

The Department representative advised RecFAC the draft timeline for the development of the Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy. The Strategy is scheduled for release in late 2023.

The Department representative requested one or two nominations from RecFAC Recreational Fishers to participate in the Rock Lobster Harvest Strategy Working Group. Brody Corbett and Kelly Hunt nominated to participate in the working group.

A RecFAC member was concerned there may not be a breath of views with only two members. They recognise the public consultation periods will provide opportunities for other viewpoints and comments to be considered.

2.5 Catch Monitoring App

Guest presenter, Holly Rickards, NRE Tas presented a brief update to the RecFAC on the Rock Lobster Catch Monitoring App. A trial period will commence prior to the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone opening on 3 December. The App will be promoted through social media, media releases, videos etc. Prizes are on offer to encourage rock lobster fishers to register. The App will be mandatory in November 2023. Future updates will address any feedback received during the trial period and may include the ability to group report. Transit reporting may also be incorporated in a later version of the App.

RecFAC were concerned the App has been released based on a small amount of feedback provided during the previous trial period and about the mandatory use of the App which has been developed and released over short period of time. RecFAC expressed concerns that during the Rock Lobster Management review, RecFAC advised a 2-year trial is needed for the development of a practical system which fishers are comfortable in using. The Department representative stated they are confident the system will be functional and easy to use due to the positive feedback so far. The App will continue to be updated in response to user feedback.

RecFAC also sought clarification on the area that will require mandatory reporting, as the Minister stated the App would be mandatory for rock lobster fishers on the east coast. Is it the Eastern Region or the East Coast Stock Rebuilding Zone?

The data received through the App will be used for management of the rock lobster fishery. Data provided will be based on how much was caught, what method of fishing and the location of the catch. Fishers can provide additional non-mandatory- Citizen Science information - rock lobster size/sex/weight, general observations, and report on how satisfied they were with their fishing.

The importance of confidence in the data was discussed – even though data may be mandatory and comes from thousands of records, data needs to be validated. RecFAC supported IMAS continuing to conduct the rock lobster surveys concurrently to assess the accuracy of the data provided through the App. In addition, compliance and resourcing need to be considered.

RecFAC have requested the Department provide further information on the points raised during this discussion at the next meeting.

3. Scalefish Fishery

3.1 Fisheries Assessment

Guest Presenter, Kate Fraser (IMAS), provided RecFAC with the draft 2020/21 scalefish fishery stock assessment as follows:

- Striped Trumpeter – depleted. The legal-size limit is currently below the size of maturity which has an impact on recruitment potential. The commercial catch is around 8 tonnes. In the 2017/18 recreational survey, recreational catch was estimated to be twice the commercial catch. Fishing mortality is estimated to be three times higher in the southeast coast region than natural mortality.
- Bastard Trumpeter – depleted. The legal-size limit is currently below the size of maturity which has an impact on recruitment potential. Both the commercial and recreational fisheries are in-shore and target juvenile fish. Commercial catch is around 6 tonnes. Gillnetting is the main method for recreational fishers.
- Southern Garfish – undetermined. Further analysis of the data is needed, however there is an indication the status will remain as depleted. Slight upward trend to the commercial catches
- Blue Warehou – depleted. The Commonwealth assessed and managed this fishery. Data is sourced from the Commonwealth. There has been a stock rebuilding strategy since 2008, however there is little indication of recovery.

The eventual phase-out of recreational netting by 2030 will reduce impacts on Bastard Trumpeter and Blue Warehou. In the meantime, reviewing the soak times and attendance netting will aim to reduce catch and wastage. For both Striped and Bastard Trumpeter the minimum size limits, which are lower than the size of maturity (SOM) would be reviewed.

The Department representative also suggested that seal depredation of striped trumpeter needs to be considered given the wastage and its depleted stock status. Reviewing catch limits and adjusting bag/possession/boat limit may influence fishers to stop fishing and reduce the loss of fish to seals. Information from Recreational Fishing Surveys may assist to understand seal interactions and behavioural changes.

RecFAC agreed the size limit for Striped Trumpeter needs to be increased to the size of maturity (60 cm) and support the concept of a lower on-water limit.

3.2 Scalefish Review

The Fisheries (Scalefish) Rules are being reviewed and will include proposed changes to:

- Calamari management
- Recreational netting
- Macquarie Harbour/ Maugean Skate interactions
- Sand Flathead catch and size limits
- Charter boat – mandatory catch report and tuna boat limits
- Number of administrative changes including VMS for the Danish Seine Fishery

The aim is for a 45-day public consultation period in March 2023. Proposed rules would come into effect 1 July 2023, which will allow the criteria assessment for limiting commercial fishing licences for Northern Calamari. After the calamari seasonal closure, only commercial calamari licence holders will have access to take calamari. Trip limits will be introduced for any commercial operator that does not have the commercial calamari endorsement. RecFAC requested the Department to clarify if the limit is per trip or per day. Recreational rule changes will come into effect from 1 November 2023, and some changes such as recreational netting will be staged.

RecFAC require a meeting in late January 2023 prior to the release of the papers for consultation.

4. Flathead Fishery Workshop Outcomes and Recovery Plan

The Flathead workshop was held 4 November. The presentations made at the workshop have since been circulated to RecFAC members. The draft summary of the workshop outcomes should be circulated within the next week. The sand flathead fishery is the most important marine recreational fishery and is a highly consumptive fishery. The sand flathead stock status has now been classified as “Depleted” state-wide; however, the stocks are more impacted in the south-east/east than the north.

RecFAC agree and support the Department to take immediate management action, followed with an extensive education and stewardship program to be run concurrently. The Department representative indicated they will develop options however have not come to a position on bag limits/boat limit levels or size limit. They will focus options to Sand Flathead only (not Tiger flathead) and if appropriate and feasible, target the management regionally. The discussions and responses discussed were more general and several management scenarios presented in a background paper were not discussed. The Chair requested the management options be worked through with a smaller working group to report back out-of-session to RecFAC with a view to advice being available to the Department for consideration in the Scalefish Review.

RecFAC recognise this is the most important recreational fishery in Tasmania and notes the stock level is now unsustainable. The TARFish CEO stated that they had placed a budget submission to government for \$5M outlining the need for more to be done on the flathead fishery. RecFAC

indicated they support this, stating the Fishery should attract the level of investment needed to support the recovery program for the flathead fishery

Fishcare will be conducting a community engagement program during summer and will be talking to fishers at boat ramps.

Members nominated for the Flathead Working Group are Andrew Hart, Mike Stevens, Kevin Bennett, Kelly Hunt and Jane Gallichan.

Recommendation 5 – Flathead Fishery

The Minister notes RecFAC's acceptance of the research and subsequent assessment of sand flathead as a depleted and unsustainable stock and the consequent need to apply management actions to rebuild the stock.

Following work by a small sub-group of RecFAC, the Committee will provide further advice on the nature of such actions, that could then be subject to public consultation in the upcoming scalefish review.

Given that sand flathead is Tasmania's most important recreational fishery, RecFAC recommends that the Minister secures significant additional funding (no less than \$5 million over five years) to support a sand flathead recovery program that would incorporate both education and stewardship components along with the necessary management actions.

5. Research Areas – Elephant Rock and North Bay Update

The Department representative updated the Committee on the current progress made for the opening of Elephant Rock and North Bay Research Areas. He advised, to identify potential research needs and to ensure an orderly opening, there may be a delay up to 12 months. He further advised there was insufficient time to consult, implement the changes and to address compliance concerns.

He suggested to keep the areas closed, and to continue working with the peak bodies to develop a proposal for a planned an opening and in line with the Government's policy position of introducing recreational only areas.

Action Item 2: *IMAS, NRE Tas and Peak Bodies to work collaboratively to develop a proposal for an orderly opening and determine the research required.*

6. Recreational Gillnetting transitional arrangements

The draft gillnet action plan has been sent to the working group for their feedback. This will be progressed when the Project Officer returns from leave.

A member raised his concerns there has been little to no information provided to the public and stakeholders regarding the transitional phase out of gillnets, in particular commercial suppliers of gillnets. RecFAC supported the proposal for commercial suppliers to receive targeted communication.

The RecFAC supported the proposals developed by the working group listed below and formal consultation process during the Scalefish Review.

Proposal:

- From 2023 – attendance netting requirements in Shark Refuge Areas (SRAs), 2-hour soak times in all other waters and banning deep water netting using a distance from shore;
- By 2025 ceasing recreational netting in shark refuge areas;
- By 2027/28 restricting recreational netting to notifiable escaped salmon events;
- Prohibiting all recreational gillnets no later than 2030.

Recommendation 6 – Recreational Gillnetting

RecFAC supports consulting on the following transitional steps to phase out recreational gillnetting by no later than 2030.

- *In November 2023 - attendance netting requirements in SRAs and 2-hour soak times in all waters, and banning deep water netting using a distance from shore;*
- *By Nov 2025 ceasing netting in Shark Refuge Areas.*
- *By Nov 2027 restricting recreational netting to notifiable escaped salmon events.*

7. Work Planning and Future Meetings

Some RecFAC members acknowledged how useful the work plan circulated at the start of the year was and requested the Department collate a work plan for 2023. Due to their work commitments and inability to attend meetings at short notice, they also requested the Department develop a meeting schedule for at least the first half of 2023.

A member has also requested meetings be scheduled either at the start of the day or towards the later part of the day to enable participants to attend their own workplaces for a half day. Another alternative proposed was to schedule meetings in two locations (eg in Hobart and Launceston) to reduce the travelling time to attend meeting, which will also facilitate better discussion.

Action Item 3: *The Department to develop a work plan and meeting schedule for 2023 and circulate to RecFAC no later than December 2022.*

8. Research and Management Updates

8.1 Research

2022/ 23 Recreational State-wide Survey, the annual Rock Lobster and Abalone Surveys – the training of the interviewers commenced in September. The screening of the participants was conducted from late September to October. The diary component of the Survey has recently commenced. Around 650 households will be involved in the State-wide Survey.

The final report has been completed for the State-wide Survey for South Australia. The report is currently being review and survey data will be compared to the voluntary App data during an 18 month trial.

The report for Tasmanian Recreational Rock Lobster and Abalone Survey from 2021/22 has been completed. It was requested the Executive Support Officer circulate the report to RecFAC.

8.2 Management

NRE Tas are boosting the summer fishing program with several casual Fisheries Engagement facilitators due to commence soon. A new Southern Fisheries Co-ordinator is due to commence early January 2023.

New rock lobster transiting reports – the first weekend received over 50 reports, mainly reporting crossing from closed to open waters. NRE Tas intend to seek feedback from those making reports. A RecFAC member said feedback they received is that not all telephone calls are being answered. It was requested the Executive Officer to confirm if the telephone reporting service is manned 24/7.

9. Emerging Issues and Matters of Importance

9.1 Marine Police

The Marine Police were located 6 days on the northeast over the season opening weekend. Generally good compliance, main concerns were gear not being correctly marked and one fisher had possession of a rock lobster in berry.

9.2 TARFish

TARFish, with Tasmania Police participated in a ABC radio interview for the opening of rock lobster season. To date TARFish has not received many complaints or feedback on the new rock lobster rules.

9.3 Rec Fisher Representatives

NRM Representative provided a brief update on current restoration projects. Two new reefs restoration sites will be implemented over summer, one at Taroona and the other at Woodbridge. A red-hand fish habitat restoration project is due to be completed in June.
